### Time-Tested Plant Pals: Plants, Uses, and Their Potential Benefits




Lavender: Aromatherapy, teas, skincare. Reduces stress, promotes relaxation, improves sleep.

It has been a busy summer of change and improvements in our much-needed community of Long-Term Care at the Village of Tansley Woods. We wish Dr. Chris Ragonetti, our Medical Director who has cared for so many, a great future as he steps into much deserved retirement and we welcome Dr. Anderson as Tansley's new Medical Director, and Dr. Tom Ragonetti as a new physician for our residents.

You likely have noticed by now the ongoing implementation of the new Dedicated Care model that has been shaping care in our LTC neighborhoods. This new approach to ensuring each resident gets continuity and familiarity with their care team is to your advantage as a family. It's personalized, familiar, and reliable for the complex needs each resident has. This improves your ability to have a close working relationship with what's best for your loved one, to develop understanding and response with the regular team tending to the needs of your loved one. It gives you the ability to keep more connected to your Care Plan, to make adjustments, and to provide the best of health for your resident. We encourage you to reach out to your neighbourhood coordinator understand this method fully.

It's always good to hear the news media cover Long Term Care issues, and recent headlines highlighted the ongoing accountability to ensure each resident gets a government mandated four hours a day of care from PSW's and nurses and 36 minutes per day of care for residents by allied health professionals, like physiotherapists and social workers. Across the province, LTC homes reached 95.5 percent of that four hour target, and met the target for allied health professionals.

Both Stacey and I as your Chairs were happy to attend the Family Councils of Ontario Conference in June. We heard from leaders across the province on how quality care is being delivered in diverse ways, of new innovations in person centered care, and we had a strong reminder to be frequent in our visits and team based on our learning.

Family Council helps address issues in Tansley that affect more than one resident, and we encourage and support families on their individual journeys with problem solving collaboration.

## National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

At the age of six, Phyllis's grandmother gave her a bright orange shirt for her first day of school. When she arrived at residential school, it was taken away – along with her other clothes – and never returned. For Phyllis, the colour orange came to symbolize the profound loss, disregard, and pain experienced by children in the residential school system.

This day calls us to remember the countless First Nations, Inuit and Métis children taken from their families, and to acknowledge the lasting harm caused by colonial policies that suppressed and attempted to erase entire cultures.

On **September 30**, we join Canadians in honouring the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and **Orange Shirt Day**, inspired by the story of Phyllis Jack Webstad.

At Schlegel Villages, our doors remain open as residents and team members come together in the spirit of learning, reflection, and conversation. Honouring diversity is one of our core values, and we believe that understanding the truth is essential to building an equitable future for all. We stand together and we remember that **Every Child Matters**.

Consider wearing an orange shirt on September 30, and understand the meaning behind it. You can purchase an official shirt through **orangeshirtday.org** to ensure a portion of the proceeds go to the Orange Shirt Society and other Indigenous-supporting organizations.


